

Military Service



On 1st March at about 0800 hours it was ambushed by Japanese cruisers Haguro and Nachi escorted by four destroyers which were engaged in a running fight. The first hit on the Exeter was in the forward boiler room and as a consequence all power and direct control for main armament was lost. Despite smoke screens laid by destroyers it received more hits. Fires broke out and all electrical power supplies failed. The ship was abandoned after 3 hours in action. In order to avoid the ship falling into Japanese hands the Captain scuttled the ship, and it was finally sunk by torpedo. 54 of the ship's company were killed in this action and 651 were rescued by Japanese ships and became POW.

Colwall Connection

William was the son of Harold and Gladys Mabel Binns, who according to the 1939 register lived at 2 Camp View, Crescent Road, Colwall. Harold worked at the mineral water plant and Gladys was a parlour maid. William had been serving in the Royal Navy for nearly five years and had last been home on leave 18 months before he was reported missing. He was a member of the "Loyal Perseverance" lodge of Oddfellows.
