During the First World War, Commonwealth camps and hospitals were stationed on the southern outskirts of Rouen. A base supply depot and the 3rd Echelon of General Headquarters were also established in the city. Almost all of the hospitals at Rouen remained there for practically the whole of the war. They included eight general hospitals, five stationary hospitals, one British Red Cross hospital, one labour hospital, and No. 2 Convalescent Depot. A number of the dead from these hospitals were buried in other cemeteries, but the great majority were taken to the city cemetery of St. Sever. In September 1916, it was found necessary to begin an extension, where the last burial took place in April 1920. The cemetery extension contains 8,346 Commonwealth burials of the First World War.

Christopher Hitchings is buried in Plot R III. Row D. Grave 4.

He was unmarried.

Evensong at the parish Church took the form of a memorial service for Private Christopher Hitchens who had died in hospital in in France.

Christopher Hitchings was born in Mathon 1883, the son of George and Elvina Hitchings. He was one of nine children and his father George was a farm labourer. In 1901 his father had died and the rest of the family were living in Sallybed Cottages, Colwall and Christopher was a wirer at the mineral water factory. In 1911 he was living with his mother and brother Henry in Hardwick Terrace, Colwall and his occupation is recorded as bottler in the mineral water works. Christopher Hitchings enlisted in Hereford and joined the Gloucestershire Regiment. He was wounded in 1916. He was gassed and died of the effects in a stationary hospital in Rouen. He is buried in St Sever Cemetery Extension.

Ernest Whatmore of Colwall is also buried there.
