Son of Henry and Mary Ann Robbins, of Chances Pitch, Colwall, Malvern.

On 1 July 1916, the 31st and 4th Divisions attacked north and south of the Serre Road and although parties of the 31st Division reached Serre, the attack failed. Early in 1917, the Germans fell back to the Hindenburg Line and on 25 February, Serre was occupied by the 22nd Manchesters. In the spring of 1917, the battlefields of the Somme and Ancre were cleared by V Corps and a number of new cemeteries were made, three of which are now named from the Serre Road. Serre Road Cemetery No.2 was begun in May 1917 and by the end of the war it contained approximately 475 graves but it was greatly enlarged after the Armistice by the addition of further graves from the surrounding area. There are now 7,127 Commonwealth burials of the First World War in the cemetery, mostly dating from 1916. Of these, 4,944 are unidentified.

Albert William Robbins is buried in Plot XII. Row A. Grave 5.

Albert William Robbins was born in Colwall in 1894, the only child of Henry and Mary Ann Robbins. Henry Robbins was a platelayer on the Great Western Railway. The family lived in Chances Pitch Colwall. In 1911 at 17 Albert was a groom. He enlisted in Malvern and joined the King's Royal Rifles. He was killed in action during the Battle of the Somme and is buried in Serre Road No 2 Cemetery.
